
## **Forgettable**

As the semi-finals got under way I tossed a coin and it came down in favour of Donner vs. Apricots. Searching for title that might convey how the match unfolded I recalled an old crossword clue: 'not a match to remember (11)'.

West led the ♠3 and declarer put up dummy's ten, overtook it with the ace and played back the ♠9. When it held she played a heart to the king and a club to the jack, West pitching the ♠4. Declarer continued with the ♣7, East winning with the ten as West threw another spade. Back came the ♥Q and declarer ducked and won the next heart.

Although declarer had taken a poor line, it was still possible to emerge with nine tricks by playing on diamonds, but she fatally played two rounds of clubs and that meant she finished one down.


East led the ♠7 and West won with the king and switched to the ♥9. Declarer won with dummy's ace, cashed the ♣A, unblocked the ♠A and played the ♣9 to the queen and king.



The heart return was taken by the king and declarer cashed two spades. West's switch to the ♥9 meant that East was now caught in a three-suit squeeze and declarer had eleven tricks and 13 IMPs.

A mildly aggressive double of a game gave Donner another 5 IMPs and then came:

Eric Kokish is a great supporter of strong overcalls, but he would I believe have taken a different position here. The defenders took two tricks, +200.






Here too declarer took eleven tricks and +650 was worth 10 IMPs.

A tactical opening bid of 2NT on ♠Q8 ♥AKJ765 ♦ K9 ♣A32 resulted in the loss of 6 IMPs and when NS missed a game in the Open Room, another 9 IMPs changed hands.



That represented another 13 IMPs and as the match neared half-way the score was 57-1.

There were changes of personnel in the Open Room for the second half, but the damage had been done. As is often the case the deals offered little in the way of opportunities for the team chasing the game.

Declarer played to ruff two spades and pitched one on the ace of hearts, so +150.

The play was essentially the same, spade lead and a trump switch, declarer rapidly getting up to eleven tricks and at last a significant swing for Apricots.

In deference to David Bird I will refrain from mentioning Board 19, a 1NT contract that is a certainly for a second volume of Misdefend These Hands with Me which delivered 6 more IMPs to Apricots.

Along came a deal with an opportunity to play for a swing:

South led the ♥K and continued with the jack, declarer winning, playing a spade to the ace, a club to the king and a second spade. That meant the defenders could cash out for one down.

South led the ♥K and declarer won at once, which was theoretically best on this layout. She continued with a spade to the ace and played a club. Was there any chance she would put in the ten, which would allow her to dispose of dummy's hearts? I didn't think it was likely, but it is the sort of play one might try when you are desperate for points. Alas, declarer won with the ace and played a second spade, so no swing.

There were no miracles and it was Donner who advanced to the Final.

## **Well-earned Swing**




Brian Senior has graciously written a deal in which several stars in the Alt Mixed teams sparkle - including his own opponent.

Playing in the Alt Mixed III, my team was beaten in Round 9 of the Swiss qualifying stage by a team featuring the strong Israeli pairing of Noga Tal and Yaniv Zack.

Seven pairs played in 4♥ on this deal, always played by East. Three were successful, four were not. Zack, alas for our cause, was one of the successful ones.

At most tables North overcalled 2NT to show the minors; I chose to only show diamonds – for the lead against a likely heart contract.


Sandra Penfold led the six of diamonds, MUD, to the three, nine and king. Zack played back his remaining diamond so I won and played the queen of clubs, which he ducked, followed by the ten of clubs.

Zack won the ace and proceeded to draw trumps ending in hand, ruffed the third club, then led a low spade to the four, nine and queen. He ruffed the diamond return and led the jack of spades to the king and ace, pinning the ten; 10 tricks.

Whether North shows both minors or only diamonds, declarer has a pretty good idea regarding the distribution by the time he reaches the crucial play. It is therefore surprising that, of the seven declarers in game, two played ace and another spade, and a third made the bizarre play of low from dummy to the four and jack (perhaps that was a miss-click?).

As well as Zack, Geir Helgemo and Namik Kokten found the play of low to the nine followed by pinning the ten – well played.

But this hand bothered me and I realised that I could have done better on defence. When declarer leads the first spade from dummy, he is hoping to find North with either 10x or H10 doubleton. What if I had played the ten! Might Zack not now have played me for the latter holding and gone down?





So I went through the play records and found that one of the four Norths put to the test had indeed put in the ten and declarer had indeed misguessed the position when his jack lost to the queen and a low spade came back, going up with the ace.

The successful defender was Sweden's Cecilia Rimstedt, and as her teammate, Geir Helgemo, was one of those to make the contract, I think we can say that this was a well-earned 12 IMPs to their side.

# **A Fatal Signal**



Both semifinals appeared to be over after the first set of 14 boards; Magic Creatures were up 49-3 against Zorlu and Donner had an even more massive lead of 51-1 over Apricots. However one surprise comeback was awaiting the kibitzers.

Mark Horton has covered the latter semifinal, so I will bring a board from the semifinal between Magic and Zorlu, in which a simple trump suit preference proved fatal.

3♦ showed an honour in hearts.

Acaf made the brave lead of a low heart from the ATxxxx; it doesn't cost if partner has the king and in case partner has the

♥Q, declarer is very likely to missguess hearts at trick one. There is of course the risk that it might cost a heart trick in case of stiff king in either opponent's hand, however the North hand is not exactly a buffet of defensive tricks anyway.

South won dummy's queen with the king and played the ◆K and received an encouraging ◆9 from partner, followed by the ace of diamonds. Looking at her own trumpholding and seeing the ◆8 in dummy, she now made the excellent play of a third diamond, ruffed with her partner's ◆9. 1 off after solid defense.

Willenken overcalled 1♥, and 2♦ was not alerted, so presumed to be natural, perhaps indicating a heart fit.

Willenken led the \$\int J\$ to declarer's ace. Tuna Aluf played one round of trumps, Willenken playing the \$\int 9\$. Probably intended as suit preference for hearts, which he bitterly regretted a moment later.


Aluf played a heart to the queen, South winning and tried the •AK before returning a desperate club in the hope her partner could ruff.

Not this time, and that meant 10 IMPs for Zorlu. Had this board been a push, Magic Creatures would have won by 0.1.

#### The final: Donner vs. Zorlu

As many know, I have a thing for redoubles (it simply tickles a lot more) so I was thrilled to see a redoubled contract in the second set of our final.

The auction unfortunately doesn't report whether North took her partner's redouble as SOS and decided to pass anyway or whether they will add a chapter about redoubles to their system notes.

East led the ♠4, which North won with dummy's ace to play the ♠Q, won by East. He now played the ♥7 to Wests king. She cashed the ♠K and exited the ♥3, finessed with the 10 in North.

Marion played the ◆9. This was the kill point. If she finessed, she would block the suit and the defense had 7 top tricks. With diamonds 3-2 she would make.

Perhaps it should have been a clue that East did not duck, but in any case she played the ◆9, and when West did not follow, exited with the ◆T to West, who in turn exited with the ♥A and jack. North played the ♣K, ducked, and took her ◆K for down 1 and -200.

It could have been better, it could have been worse for NS. It turned out to better when their teammates had their back on this board.

Same auction without the redouble.

Helgemo led the ♠4, which North unlike Marion led run to the king. West tried the ♥A and received a discouraging 7 from partner and now found the switch of the club 4 to the ten and jack, ducked. This was not good news for declarer.

Helgemo contuned with the ♣3 to his partner's ace, and West cleared the suit. Declarer played the ♠Q to East's ace and he cashed his two club tricks (the others picthing hearts and spades, declarer getting squeezed from the ♠Q) and exited with a diamond to dummy's jack. North desperately tried to cash the diamond tricks, but no luck here and the defense got two more tricks for 3 off and +500 for Donner, which meant 7 IMPs.

The final was close, but on board 12 Aluf-Kökten went overboard in 6♣ missing two aces for 10 IMPs away, and the last 4 boards were pushes, including board 14 where Larsson found an elegant diamond shift to push the board for 3NT down 2.

Donner won by 70.1-52 after 32 boards. Afterwards he sent the following message acknowledging his opponents:



"The Turkish team we played against were incredibly sportsmanlike. Most are, but they were in particular."

We hope to see all sportsmanlike participants back in October.

Congratulations to Team Donner for a great performance and to Zorlu for making it all the way to the finals.




