# Nine Men's Morris

Nine Men's Morris is one of the games which the computer has 'solved' in that with best play on both sides it must end in a draw. That is never going to be the situation in bridge, as these two deals from the first round of the MontreALT aptly illustrate:

West led the ♥5 and declarer took East's ten with the king, played a diamond to the ace and ran the jack to West's queen. He won the heart continuation, played the ♠Q, covered by the king and ace and cashed three diamonds. East pitched the ♥Q on the fourth round, so declarer took four tricks in the heart suit! With the ♣A onside he recorded +460.

West led the ♣3 and East won with the jack and switched to the ♥Q. Declarer won with the ace and went after the diamonds, losing the second round to West's queen. When West returned the ♣2 declarer again played low from dummy (no doubt thinking that no-one leads from ace to four against 3NT) and East won with the queen and played the ♥J. Declarer ducked that, but East switched to a club West's ace representing the setting trick and a gain of 11 IMPs.

What do you think West's double was asking for? Absent any agreement the answer is somewhere between a spade and your shortest suit/major. It might make a good question on the bridge edition of Pointless.

When East went with the ♥T declarer won with the queen and cashed the diamonds. East pitched three hearts, so declarer took the three tricks in the suit that were always there for +950 and a 16 IMP swing.



# Back in the Alt Routine

For the first match back after the short summer break my co-commentator Peter Lund wanted to kibitz his fellow countryman Dennis Bilde, which had the added spice of it being the match between the teams Vinita and Gupta, captained by wife and husband Vinita and Naren Gupta respectively. We didn't have to wait long for the action to start.

Morten Bilde attacked with the ♥J and Bessis ruffed the third round, then played a small trump towards dummy's ten, ducked by South. A club to the ace was followed by the ace and queen of trumps. South won, to switch to a diamond, a second diamond was cashed for a club discard, and declarer breathed in relief when the club queen popped up on the next round. 10 IMPs well deserved for getting to the better game.

Vinita Gupta





Out of the thirty-two tables twenty played in 4♠, all except one making it, a couple even making an overtrick. Ten played in 3NT, just three making. The remaining two pairs stopped in 3♠.

Later in the match Gupta got another double digit gain for choosing a better game contract, helped in their choice by Dennis Bilde's double of a Stayman 2♣:

With the trumps behaving and diamonds 3-3 there was nothing to the play and 11 tricks resulted.

With no double to guide him, Bessis had to choose a lead from two unattractive minor suits. He chose a diamond after which declarer can even make an overtrick if she gets everything right.

Winning the first trick in dummy North finessed in hearts, cashed the ace, and led a second diamond. Bessis took his ace and switched to the ♣6.

You might think that declarer is in big trouble at this point, his weak point attacked, and the ♥K an entry to the hand with long clubs. Look more carefully, and you will see that the ♣8 in declarer's hand, together with the J9 in East, block the suit.

Not having second sight Vinita ducked two rounds of clubs and took the third, discarding hearts from dummy, and had now reached this position with the lead in North, needing five more tricks:

You have to find the queen of spades. A point count tells you nothing, but the distribution gives you some clues. When you cash the diamonds you find that they are 3-3, the opening lead thus from Axx. West has ♥Kxx(x). West still has the club ten, and is favourite to hold the 13th club, because with JT9(x) Bessis would surely have led clubs, and even with J9xx he might have preferred that to a diamond.

All of which points to the spade length in East. However declarer chose to play for the queen in West, perhaps on the basis that with 5332-shape, East would have no way to partner's winners. So in the end two down and 13 IMPs for Mr. Gupta.

Three others went down in 3NT while 20 made it. All seven in 4♥ made, as did the one North who unadventurously played 2♠. Nobody contrived to play 3NT by South, where only the double dummy lead of the ♣K would give you a headache.

And so to the final board of the match. As dealer at love all, what would you open with this fine collection if not playing a strong club or the like?

What now? Pass or bid 6? You have an awful lot to spare for your bidding to date. But you need partner to have an ace and a good card somewhere else. Neither of our Easts could resist and raised themselves to a slam that was just on a finesse. But a losing finesse, as you can see:

As you can see, Bessis nearly perpetrated a slam Biltcliffe Coup (that is, reopening an auction to allow opponents to find their optimal, higher scoring spot). But he was lucky when NS didn't capitalise.

Dwyer must have considered raising with the spade control and two quick tricks, but from where he sat there could easily be two losers. And so to Zia:

The one level opener on 7 HCP, combined with EW's pre-empt and raise, left Naren Gupta with a tough problem at his second turn. In the end he took the mild gamble that his partner had a spade control, while leaving the possibility of a grand open.

Of course Zia had nothing to add other than repeat his long suit, and there they played, making easily. In fact 13 tricks were made at both tables when spades weren't led at trick one.

In case you think bidding slam should be easy for these world class players, even facing aggressive intervention, I can tell you that only seven NS pairs did bid slam, and at two of those tables EW sacrificed in 6♠, which can go five off on best defence, making it a phantom save. However it was only three down at one table and two down at the other, despite the best opening lead of ♦A.

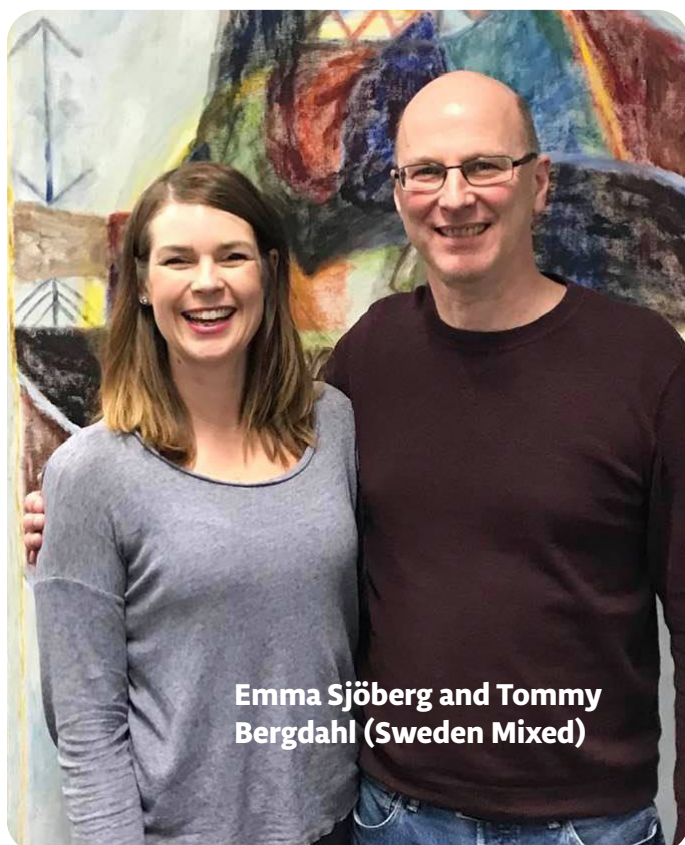
