# **Alt about Undos**

#### by Christina Lund Madsen

In the semifinal between SweIce and Red Devils, a declarer from Red Devils landed in 5♥X after this auction:

WEST	NORTH 4♥	<b>EAST</b> Pass	<b>south</b> Pass

East was on lead with

**♠** AKT43 ♥ Q42 ♦ 95 ♣ QJT

He intended to lead the ♠A, but playing with cards on BBO (rather than hand diagrams) BBO autosorts the suits after a trump suit has been decided. So instead of clicking on the ♠A, East hit the ♥Q.

He asked for an undo, but was not granted one by declarer.

The semifinal was close with a victory for Red Devils by 53-40.1 and the result on the board could potentially have changed the outcome.

After this was reported, the Alt Organisers discussed what to do in a situation with an obvious misclick and a refusal of an undo.

First of all, we believe it is in the spirit of the game and the Alt to grant an undo if it - as in this case - is an indisputable misclick. Secondly, we encourage players to adjust their settings to use hand diagrams rather than pictures of cards to avoid this auto-placing the trump suit (it does not happen using hand diagrams).

This incident has led the Alt to amend the rules regarding undos in the following way:

To avoid such refusals in obvious miscklick-situations (bidding as well as play), each player will get a "challenge" (in the RR as well as the KO-phase) whereby the TD can be summoned to the table.

Play at the moment of the refusal must be shut down till the TD arrives. The TD is the one who can assess the situation, and if he believes the undo is justified by an obvious misclick that no reasonable player should refuse, the undo has to be accepted by the opponents.

The CoC of the Alt Events will be adjusted to reflect this policy.

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# **An Amazing Pair of Pushes**

#### - The Final of the MontreAlt


Team Gupta (Bessis-Lorenzini, Gupta-Mahmood and Muller-De Wijs) dominated the Swiss and won their quarterfinal match against Macavity quite comfortably.

After a narrow escape in the semifinal against Koeppel they faced the Red Devils (Bahbout-De Donder, Caputo-Van der Vorst, Coenraets-Engel and Arts-De Roos) in the final. The Belgians qualified as eighth for the KO phase where they eliminated Black and Sweice.

Reaching the final came probably as a surprise to them because they could only field one regular partnership. In the first half Geert Arts and Steve De Roos played in the open room against Thomas Bessis-Cédric Lorenzini, while Steven De Donder partnered Zvi Engel in the closed room against Naren Gupta-Zia Mahmood.

The first score was for the Red Devils:

Against 3NT Bessis led the ♣5. De Roos played low in dummy and took North's #10 with the ace. He continued with the ♠K to South's bare ace. Bessis returned the ♣9 covered by the ♣Q which held. Now declarer ran the ♠10 and ♠9, entered his hand with the ♥K and advanced the ♥J. South, who had discarded two hearts, covered with the queen. Declarer won with the ace, crossed to the ♥10 and cashed ♠Q, ♥2 and ♠A: ten tricks, 430.



When Bessis opened 1♣, Lorenzini had an awkward bidding problem. He didn't want to pass and decided to bid his best major. Bessis had a sound splinter and the train stopped in 4♠. De Roos led the ♠A, collecting the 10 from West. De Roos was unaware of North's undersized spade holding. The only chance he saw to beat the contract was through a diamond ruff. So he continued diamonds after which the contract could no longer be defeated. Lorenzini drove out the ♠A and only lost a trick to the ♥A: NS plus 420.



At the other table De Donder passed 1. Gupta balanced so the final contract became 3. which Engel made with an overtrick: plus 130 for the Red Devils, 7 IMPs to Gupta.

On Board 4 Gupta and Zia lost 13 IMPs when they bid 6 which required a friendly lie of the cards: minus 100. Arts-De Roos did not even make a slam try and scored an uneventful plus 650. The next hand was more interesting:



Bessis found an excellent vulnerable save against 4♠ and doubled when his opponents took the push. He led the ♠K, cashed the ♥A and played a heart. North could not ruff but had the ♣A as the setting trick: plus 100 to Gupta.

Engel did not bid 5♣ over 4♠. He led the •K and shifted to the ♣10. When that held, he continued with the ♣9 to North's jack. Gupta ruffed and pulled two rounds of trumps, bringing down the queen. He cashed two more spades before successfully playing a heart to the nine. For some reason North followed with the ♥8. This was the position with West on lead:




Declarer ruffed the ◆10 in hand and played another heart. Bessis rose with the ace and played the ◆A. East had to ruff, played a heart to the king and lost the last trick to the ♣A.

Declarer survives if he ruffs the useless ♣K and plays a heart to the 7 (or advances the ♥10 if North had sticked to his ♥8). Gupta still won 2 IMPs on the board and now trailed by 13.


After a push on Board 6 Gupta gained another 10 IMPs when Bessis propelled his partner into game while at the other table Engel invited (or perhaps his 3♥ was meant to be forcing) and saw his partner pass. The Red Devils picked up 2 IMPs on a partscore deal. Then came this:



Zia made the more practical bid of 3NT. As to the play the hand could originate from a textbook. North led the ◆K, ducked by declarer, followed by the #Q, also ducked and the ◆J, taken perforce by the ace. Zia drove out the ♠A, won the spade return, cashed another spade, crossed to the ♥A and cashed the ♥K. North followed suit in spades and hearts so he could not have

four clubs. Zia cashed ♣A and ♣Q and claimed ten tricks: 12 IMPs to Gupta, who now led 31 to 24.

They increased their margin by 5 IMPs when the Red Devils went down at both tables and by another 2 IMPs on this slam:



The bidding by both EW pairs was impressive. However, the grand slam that they reached was unsound. Arts went two light after Lorenzini's smart lead of a low club. De Donder led the ♣A and Zia only lost a trick to the ♣J.



Against Bessis West led a low heart to the ace in dummy. Bessis cashed the ace and king of spades and played the \$9. West showed out and did not have an intermediate trump. So declarer could ruff with the 4. He cashed the \$K, crossed to the \$Q and claimed.


Engel's task was much harder when West led a traditional trump. He played low in dummy, East inserted the 10 and South won with the ace. He crossed to the ♠A and played the ♠7, seeing the ♠10 appear from East. Engel spent several minutes weighing his chances. He could play the ♠K and ruff a spade in dummy. Due to the club lead he would then be forced to overtake ♣K, so this play would require the clubs to break (unless ♠10 was a false card and the ♠Q drops under the king).



Engel chose the probably best and here winning line of finessing. When the ♠J held, he could soon claim his 2140.

After the next hand, Warren Spector commented on BBO: 'An amazing pair of pushes'.




Both NS pairs drove to 6♠ that required finding the ♣Q. Both Lorenzini and De

# **Defence** is tough



We continue with the second half of the final.

Here's a tough defensive problem. You have doubled because of your two quick tricks, and it is certainly right to lead your AK this time.

When partner discards on the second round, what do you play at trick three? Does the discard make a difference?

If partner has nine spades there is no trick there, so you need a diamond ruff. If partner has eight spades you can beat the contract by one trick by playing a spade, but if he also has a heart (North surely

has at least six of them), then a diamond will take it two off. Since your side can probably make 620 in four spades, it is not unreasonable to go for the diamond ruff, and that is what de Roos did.

He was disappointed. Arts had discarded the ♣3 on the second diamond, but I am not sure what discard would say 'I don't have a trump, play a spade'. The auction was friskier at the other table, where it looks like nobody was sure who was sacrificing.



I was glad to see the final double to stop the merry-go-round as by this point I was getting dizzy. The hand was over quickly, South cashing three clubs then trying the ace of hearts, ruffed and claimed, for 8 IMPs to Gupta.

The Red Devils hit back two boards later, gaining 7 IMPs, when Zvi Engel was doubled in a cold 3 ♦ for 470 while teammate Geert Arts was going 2 off in 3 ♥ for 200.

And on the next board they scored even bigger:

Thomas Bessis' sudden leap to slam looks at best agricultural. Facing a hand with "about 8 tricks" when you have say 2,5 tricks also seems at best optimistic.

Even on a friendly heart lead the slam has just about no chance, but de Roos found the excellent lead of a small spade. Lorenzini ducked that, won the next spade, and played winners, hoping for either a horrible defensive error or a miraculous layout. Neither was available.

In the other room South played 3NT with an overtrick, so Red Devils scored 12, putting them into a 19-16 IMP lead for the segment, trailing by just 1.1 overall.




The next board was flat, but then the storm clouds broke. On board 25 de Roos-Arts played 4♠ on a 4-3 fit, ran into a cross-ruff and went three off vulnerable, and on the one after they declared 1NT, again three off vulnerable.

As I commented to the BBO kibitzers, minus 300 twice in a row doesn't look pretty when you aren't sacrificing.

So it proved, when on the first of those boards 3NT had nine top tricks for 600, then on the second de Donder-Engel were one down in 3♥. 23 IMPs away in two boards, plus a couple more on the next, meant the Devils were suddenly 22 behind on the set, 26.1 overall, with five to play.

Then this:

with his king. He played another top diamond which de Roos ruffed, but that was his last trick. His next spade was ruffed by Lorenzini who drew the remaining trumps, and the defence had only winners left. Minus six and minus 1400. So yes, defence is tough - but only most of the time.

Looking at the NS hands, where would you like to play? Maybe 3NT, maybe 4♥, or even 5♦? All have chances, but none look easy despite your high combined point count.

Lorenzini-Bessis didn't have to solve this conundrum. I said earlier that aggressive opening bids can be a two-edged sword, and this time it really was a case of "he who lives by the sword dies by the sword".

South led the ◆A,then played his ♥K, taken by dummy's ace. On the ♠Q North discarded a club and declarer took his ace, then played another which Bessis won

GIB says that 3NT can be made on any lead, but it sure ain't easy single dummy. De Wijs led the ♠Q which Engel rather naturally took with his king, but now he could no longer make. His ♥K was ducked, so he played four rounds of diamonds ending in dummy then played a top heart. De Wijs simply won that, cashed his ♠J, played another to Muller's ace and ten, then a club through declarer sealed his fate.

17 IMPs away, and the tournament almost surely with it, 43.1 behind and four to play. Board 31 was a non-vulnerable slam on a finesse, not bid at either table.

Red Devils did pull 10 back on the last board when 4♠ made at one table and failed at the other, so the final score was Gupta 99.1 - Red Devils 66.

Congratulations (again!) to the Gupta team, and well played to the Red Devils.




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
