
Spring Bridge



How would your life look if you had not become a bridge player?


- Businessman (not clear how successful). A gambler, but unstressed and happy as I always get lucky.



What would our galaxy of stars make of this deal from the opening round?

If NS find their heart fit they might bid 6♥. Absent a club lead I think you would be happy enough to be there.

A club lead is threatening, but the capricious nature of the bridge gods is illustrated by the situation in the diamond suit.

Before we leave this deal its worth mentioning the psychological aspect. If you are NS it would be all too easy to start worrying about the possibility that your opponents will have bid $6 \checkmark$ (or on a really bad day $7 \checkmark$).

Don't! The deal is dead and buried - make sure all your thoughts are focused on the new set of cards you can see on the one that follows.







Due to the Irish macho-bidding, East-West reached the safe 5. Bad news is they could make 6 on the actual layout. Good news is it was still a 6-IMP pick-up when the Irish at the other table stayed out of game. 2NT Minors, could be very weak

I always envied using the 2NT-opening to show both minors, but here it was hardly a success with East's absolute maximum given the favorable vulnerability.

Despite South's vulnerable overcall and North's "good" heart raise, Helness had enough belief in his declaring skills to consider Qxxx a solid stopper (heaven forbid Helgemo should be declarer).

Down 2 was a push, when Rodwell at the other table as the only one among our stars refrained from overcalling 1♥ over 1♦ and so Baqai-Dunitz landed in 3NT down the same two despite Meckstroth leading a spade rather than a heart. There was plenty of time.

Despite knowing North held a heart honour and his partner's 3⁺-bid, Zamir also thought 3NT would lie well is his hands. He declared it as well as Helness for minus 100.

That was a lucky 11 IMPs gain when East at the other table was the main character in another classic "don't make T/O doubles of low-level contracts with a void".



It is unclear whether East's double showed extras. I assume 1 did not show 5, and East probably tried to get his three spades into play rather than just bidding 3, but West looking at vulnerable opponents and a 14-count opposite a partner who opened reasonably decided to pass.

After the unfortunate lead of the \blacklozenge A followed by the queen, South managed to scramble together 8 tricks (one club in addition to the five hearts and two diamonds), resulting in +670.

Yet that was not the biggest swing...

Yesterday we started late for the sake of our West Coast-players, and so Naren Gupta was awake and perky by the second round. Brink led the ♥K, ruffed by declarer to play a diamond to the queen, cash the ace and play a club to hand to ruff a diamond, nodding to the friendly opponents. Despite the losing club finesse, it was 920 for Gupta and 14 IMPs.

Alpha Zero Returns





The dreaded appearance of the super computer Alpha Zero is still some time away, but when it does appear it may revolutionise the way we think about bridge.

For sure it will be more aggressive in the bidding and it's awesome analytical powers will come in handy at single dummy play and defence.

This deal is from Round 2:

Board 3. Dealer South. EW Vul.



You don't have to be Nostradamus to predict that South will open the bidding with some preemptive effort. Then it is not at all unlikely that EW will reach a spade contract. They might even reach the dizzy heights of 6♠.

Let us take a look at our heroes' quests.

South led the ◆10 and when dummy's queen held declarer cashed the ♠AK. When South pitched a heart declarer played a diamond to the nine and a club to the king, but North won and returned the ♥5 leaving declarer a trick short, -100.

If South's 3♥ had been based on a 2-7-1-3 it is not enough to find South with just the ♣A as he can rise with the ♣A and exit with a club. He has to have both club honours.

What do you prefer on the East hand? 4♥, 5♠, 4♠ or 6♠?


I think Alpha Zero would approve of the 3♥ bid chose by South at every table. Whether it would agree with some of the bids chosen subsequently is another matter.

This strikes me as a very tough deal to analyse. Once you have worked out that a 2-2 trump break only helps when South has both club honours you might play a diamond at trick 3 and then play a club. You need to keep in mind that you still need to find South with both club honours. I think that is about a 1 in 8 chance, and I have this strange feeling that Alpha Zero might just take a different view and duck the first round of clubs completely!



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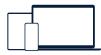
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
