#### **Knockout Stage**

The team placed 1st in the Round Robin gets to choose the opponent for the semifinal from the teams placed 3th – 4th in the Round Robin. We ask the winners to inform us of their choice immediately after the results of the last round.

Semifinal will be played over 32 boards, 2 separate segments of 16 boards each.

In the semifinal the higher ranked teams in the Round Robin may select any one of the two segments in which to have seating rights and the opponents then have seating rights in the other-segment. In the semifinal no. 1 - 2 get a carry over of 10.1 - 6.1 IMP respectively.

- I'm really good at making crepes and I'm really bad at answering questions.


Geoff Hampson's question for you: When did you last have a driver's license?

- Kiss Anam fo sho. ☺ I have partnered Gavin already but I'd still give him a shot by racing Sjoert on the ice rink before he dies.



Sporting contests are riddled with clichés and the advent of the European Football Championships will surely see the appearance of many of those that are associated with the game. 'Schoolboy defending', 'We're taking it one match at a time' and 'Parking the bus' are well known, as is the classic 'Sick as a Parrot'.

However, my favourite is 'It's a game of two halves'. That's a cliché that could be used in bridge, but in matches in both bridge and football some halves are more important than others. That was certainly the case in the Round 5 encounter between Palma and Lebowitz, where the score after 10 of the 20 deals was 13-4 in favour of Palma.

North led the ♣6 for the eight, ten and king and declarer cashed the ♠KJ, South discarding the ♥9. Declarer took a third round of trumps, South discarding the ♠5, played a heart to the ace and drew the

outstanding trump, South parting with the ♣2. The ♥J was covered by the queen and king as North discarded the ♣7. When declarer cashed two clubs South had to part with a second spade and declarer pitched dummy's ♥3, played a heart to the ten, the ♠J to the king and the ♠10 collecting South's queen along with +1440.



Declarer took and early heart finesse but lost a trick to the ♠Q, so +990 and a loss of 10 IMPs which gave Lebowitz the lead.

Sylvia Moss and Roger Lee also bid and made 7♦.


North led the ♥K and declarer won with dummy's ace, played a club to the ace, a diamond to the ace and the ♣J. When the queen appeared declarer won, cashed the ♦K and then played the ♠J, claiming when North pitched a heart, +400.

East led the ♦A and continued with the eight, West winning with the queen, cashing the king then ace of clubs and then playing two more rounds of diamonds.

Although there was no trump promotion the contract was three down, -800 and 9 IMPs changed hands.

West led the ♥K and declarer won with dummy's ace, played a diamond to the ace and the ♣K and a club. West won and switched to the ♠A followed by the eight, the defenders scoring four tricks, -500.

Make a note of North's fit showing 4♣ bid, which enabled his side to find the save - the only pair to do so.



North led the ♣Q and declarer won and played the ♥Q. The defenders could score three tricks, but a spade went on the ♦K for +620 and 3 IMPs.

Seven players elected to open 3♦, which says something about the modern approach to bidding. West doubled three times and overcalled 3♥ three times.


South led the ◆7 for the queen, king and ace and when South ducked the first round of hearts, playing the ten, dummy was out of the game. At trick three declarer tried a spade to the nine and South won with the king, cashed the ♥A and played a second diamond for the ten and jack. Declarer played three rounds of clubs and North won and cashed the ♠A followed by two more spades for two down, -500.

#### 2♣ Transfer to 2♦

East started with three rounds of clubs, the ace, king and eight and West ruffed and returned the ♠6 for the jack, queen and king. A diamond to the king revealed the trump position and declarer had to lose three trump tricks and the ♥A which meant two down, -200, and a 12 IMP loss.

The swings on 12, 13 & 16 were enough to see Palma home 41-20, 14.76-5.24 VP.




# **Always Believe**

Agustin Madala was the only declarer who believed he could make make this thin 4♥ contract from Round 3:

When Simon de Wijs led the ♣8, Madala put up the 10 from dummy. Bauke Muller took the ♣A, cashed both his other aces and exited with a club. Madala overtook the ♣J with the king, played the ♥4 to the queen, cashed the ♥A and claimed when the ♥K dropped.

In the other room Zia Mahmood probably expected the ♣8 lead to be a singleton and anticipated to go two or even three off.

So he played a small club from dummy in the first trick. Now South, Michael Rosenberg, withheld his ace and 4♥ could no longer be made.

Two other declarers also fatalistically played low in the first trick but they both saw South go up with the ♣A, once after the second or fourth best ♣3 lead.

Leslie Amoils still went off when he won the heart return by Michal Nowosadzki with the ace. Gunnar Hallberg managed to make an overtrick after Paulo Sarmento had returned a club.

The other four tables were not in game.





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
