





As Ola and Mikael Rimstedt sat down against Zia and Zach Grossack, Ola began the characteristic banter by asking Zia: "So you lost to Mikael in golf?" Zia: "It was an easy thing" Sadly for Zia golf wasn't the only disciplin he lost to Mikael in.

West led the ♦ and East won with the jack as declarer followed with the ten, and switched to the ♥J, declarer winning in hand and exiting with the ♠6 for the eight ten and jack. East cashed the ♦K before exiting with a heart, and declarer won in dummy, played the ♠Q, ruffing and playing his trumps. West pitched the ♦4, but then fatally threw the ♦8 which meant that East was squeezed in the minors. He pitched his diamonds, so declarer could have scored the last trick with the 'beer-card'. In any event, it was +420.

If declarer had held on to the <10, the defenders would have been in trouble. East's holdings in the minors mean that although a diamond ruff can be prevented, there is no defense to the potential squeeze without the count. This will be the ending:



When declarer cashed the last heart discarding a diamond or spade form dummy East has to throw a diamond and declarer can exit with a diamond and score the last three tricks.



West's pass over 4♥ indicated a modest hand.

West led the $\blacklozenge9$ and declarer won with the ten and played the $\blacklozenge6$, West going up with the king and playing a second heart. Declarer won in dummy, ruffed the $\blacklozenge10$ and cashed all his remaining trumps. East, down to $\blacklozengeA \diamondsuit AK \clubsuit QJ10$ was squeezed in three suits and pitched the $\diamondsuit K$. Meanwhile, West had parted with three clubs, and proved to be enough to deflect declarer from the winning line of exiting with a diamond. He played two rounds of clubs and was one down, -50 and 10 IMPs worse off. It does not help if West allows East to win the spade at trick two – in order to hold on to three diamonds East will be forced to pitch the A, but will then be squeezed in the minors by the last heart. He will have to release a diamond but then declarer ducks a diamond, wins the club return in dummy and ducks another diamond.

He chose the latter, returning the ♣3. Declarer could cash dummy's clubs and then play the ♦Q for the king and ace. The ♥A mean that he could return to dummy to play a diamond to the ten, +600.

North led the $\bigstar5$ and South won with the ace and when the nine took the next trick he continued with a third spade, declarer winning with the king and playing the \clubsuitA followed by the queen. South now had a choice; to duck, hoping to get a useful signal from partner on the third round of the suit, or to win and exit with something.

If South ducks the Q and wins the next round North can pitch a diamond to suggest there is no future in that suit and now South has to find a switch to the K, removing a vital entry to dummy.



West led the ♥3 for the nine, ten and king and declarer returned the four for the queen and ace. The ♣10 was covered by the king and ace and West continued with the queen followed by the eight. Declarer ruffed in dummy and ruffed a heart with the ♠9, but West overruffed and exited with a spade. Declarer could not avoid the loss of another trump and two diamonds, -100 but an 11 IMP gain.



South led the ♦4 for the king and ace and North switched to the ♣4, South winning with the jack. He continued with the ♣2 and declarer won with the ace, cashed the ♥J, ruffed a diamond high, ruffed a club high, cashed the ♥A and then ran the ♠9. North could win, but was endplayed, +620. Not easy to see, but South must switch to a spade after winning the first club.


South started with the ace, king and ten of spades and North ruffed, cashed the $\blacktriangleleft A$ and continued with the $\blacklozenge 7$, South ruffing. He tried to cash the $\blacklozenge A$, but declarer could ruff, cross to the $\clubsuit K$, ruff a diamond and cash the $\clubsuit A$, two down, -300. If South exits with a fourth spade declarer can ruff in dummy, but then the **+**Q gives the defenders a third undertrick.

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
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
