
Garozzo was Right

There can be little doubt that Benito Garozzo was right when he said that a player who always found the best opening lead would win everything on offer and we saw a perfect example on this deal from the match between Parker and Wilson in the opening round:


North led the ♣A and South followed with the queen but the opening lead meant the defenders could cash only three tricks in the suit to go with the ♠A, +600.

Holding only four clubs if North was determined to lead one there is something to be said for starting with the two, but one might also consider leading a passive spade.


North led the ♠10 and declarer won with dummy's ace and played the ♠4. South lost no time in putting up the ace and switching to the ♣Q, -100 and a 12 IMP pickup.





No matter how bad your contract may appear, you should never give up hope. This innocuous looking deal from round 1 is a classic example:

Declarer won the lead of the ♥9 with the ace, ran the ♠7 to West's ten, won the heart return with dummy's jack and ran the ♣9. With the black suits behaving it was easy to score 11 tricks, +660.

Obviously NS had an accident.

West led the ♦2 and declarer won with dummy's ace, played a spade to the ace, a club to the ace and a second spade, East winning with the king and exiting with the ♥5. When the jack held declarer played a diamond to the king and ruffed a diamond, east discarding a spade. West won the next trick with the ♠Q as dummy and East pitched clubs and West exited with a heart which left declarer with only nine tricks, -50 and an 11 IMP loss.

As the play went, East should have pitched a club on the third round of diamonds.

As declarer quickly realised all he had to do was find clubs 3-3 with West holding the queen and he would have survived his breach of Burn's Law.

When and where were you born, where do you live and how many wives and children do you have?


- I was born october 26th 1967 in Buenos Aires, Argentina, where I live. I had one wife, mother of my two kids, Bruno (21) and Dana (19). Now I'm living with Pam and her daughter all together with Uma (dog) and Roma (cat) in a nice house.

How has life been for you in Argentina during Covid?

- Very bad, we had the longest quarantine in the world and it was not effective. Many cases and deaths per day and it continues. My personal life has changed, I am a bridge teacher and we had to turn everything to BBO. My students got used quickly and we are managing very well. Also not traveling and staying home was strange, but we soon found many good things to do all together. I am very happy that a group of young kids started bridge (my kids and son in law and friends' kids) and I am their coach and mentor. So happy to have them and hope I can go with them to the next World Junior Championship.

Tell us about your life when there is no Covid.

- Well, I cant remember was so long time ago! But I think I've always been a bridge teacher when I am home, then I started to play also professionally. I love my bridge travels, first representing my country, then with Lavazza and now with Margie.



I am very happy to meet people and share life with them, but I am also happy to be at home with my family.

How did you begin to play bridge?

- My parents and grand parents where playing bridge (sort of) and I was always very interested in any kind of game. Once my parents were taking lessons Sunday nights and one of their friends didn't come and the teacher asked me to play (I was 8/9 years old) and that was my first. Then they recruited me for the Argentinian juniors and thats all started.

What interests/occupations do you have outside bridge?

- I am organizing a game with around 100 people. It's a fantasy game of Argentinian soccer and we have a lot of fun. I am the manager so that makes me very busy. It's the ALEPRODE (PRO = pronosticos DE = deportivos - means sports forecast).



I also like to play table tennis and tennis. I like making asados and share with friends and family.

Rate these activities according to what you like best: Tennis, Bridge, Dancing.

Bridge is by far the best. I like my students, I like to play and it is far more than a job. Playing tennis is fun, I don't do that as often and my opps always get mad at me because of my very effective (non)style. I prefer table tennis, and I love dancing, especially latin music. I lived six years in Venezuela and spent three of them going to discos every weekend to watch them dancing. Finally I decided to try and now I can move my legs, I took lessons with a cousin. Salsa Casino is the best, but Merengue and Bachata I like too. So: BRIDGE, DANCING, TENNIS.

Agustin Madala's question for you: Tell the story about a lady who hired you to play a pair event and made some miscalculation about your fee.

- It was Giovanna, an Italian lovely old lady who used to play every day at the club with good players. She asked me to go to Punta del Este for a weekend tournament (I was just starting my professional career). I told her my fee, we played, enjoyed and had a good result. The last day she asked me to go with her to the bank, I waited outside, then we got to the hotel and there she took a big pack of dollars from her chest and gave it to me. It was 5.000 dollars! I said "Giovanna, I told you cinquecento (500), non cinquemilla (5000)." Of course I gave her the 4500 back and she said it looked very expensive but she didn't know me, she was going to pay and then wouldn't invite me anymore. After that we played many times together, so many fun stories about her.

Tell us about yourself as a teenager.

- I was a very ludic young guy, always asking my friends what to play, I played all the time and everything. Organized meetings at home and play anything till late morning.

As a boy I remember staying at home alone (I have two older sisters and both parents were busy psychoanalysts) and put little cars and run races, play with dices and cards, or with little figures of soccer players, and later when everybody was home I tell them how they did.

"Mom, you won two races or came second in the GENERALA today," but I recall being a happy kid. I soon started bridge, I had to share school and friends with tournaments and trips but was good.

What is the strangest thing a female admirer ever did to get your attention?

- Once after a closing ceremony at a Brazilian tournament (I was with my wife the entire week but she left the last day) I went to bed alone of course and the telephone rings. I picked up, nobody answered. Then the door knocks. I go out and see a woman that I hadn't noticed before, who wanted to enter in my room... Can't tell more.

And my first girlfriend (ex at that time) knew I was going to Europe to play a tournament, so she said: "I will go to Europe too to visit my sister (I was in Venezuela with my new girlfriend, my ex was in Argentina). Let's meet in Paris for a couple of days" and both of us arranged our schedule to combine one day in Paris. It was a great idea of hers, but I chose the Venezuelan, who I married, and we spent 20 years together, divorced 8 years ago.

What is your greatest weakness?

- I have almost no more hair! I trust people and maybe I am a little naive. It could be a weakness or strength, who knows? I want people to like me so I feel bad when they don't.

What has been the highlight of your life?

- Of course having my two kids, since they were born having them sleeping on my chest is the best memory. Professionally all the Lavazza time (5 years playing in such a great team with excellent players) was unforgettable I have to thank Agustin and the rest of the team for that, also was stressful but many satisfactions. Now with Margie we had great time traveling and playing together, much more relaxed and fun!

What is the most immoral thing you ever did?

- I am a straight one so didn't do many in my life, maybe once I put more vegetables at the supermarket after they weighted.

How would your children describe you in three words?



- Fun, caring and giving.

If you could change something in your past, what would it be?

- I am happy with my past so I don't think I would like to change anything.

What goals do you have for the rest of your life?

 I would like to live healthy and happy for the rest of my life, helping my close people to achieve their goals.

Who do you think should be a future victim in the bulletin?


- I would like to nominate Perlita Sultan: What happened in that place near Medellin in 2019 we went with Pam and had a crazy spiritual adventure?

In the closed room Charlie Hoyos missed the opportunity to direct the lead when he rebid his JTxxxx over 3♦.

With nothing else to go on Janice Molson led a spade. Declarer pitched a heart on the A and made eleven tricks.

In the open room Zachary Grossack made the smart bid of 3♥:

Linda Robinson duly led the ♥4. After winning the first trick with the ♥Q and cashing the ♥A Grossack shifted to the ♣5, burying the heart ruff.

In his defence it must be noted that EW play 3rd and 5th, so East could have started with J943 and had given suit preference holding the A. If declarer has a 3=2=7=1 a club return would be necessary but that hand is hardly compatible with the bid of $3 \spadesuit$.




