The Swingometer



For as long as I can remember the UK has used a 'swingometer' to predict the results for general elections. Currently it suggests that in the next election the Conservative party will win, but fail to obtain an overall majority. It could easily be used in bridge matches, the reporter predicting how many IMPs were likely to change hands after seeing the result in one room. Whatever you think of that there were plenty of IMPs changing hands in Round 5:

Declarer tried a spade and South took the king and played another diamond, declarer ruffing with the king and playing the ♠J. South won and cashed the ♥10, North pitching his remaining spade.


When South exited with the ♥8 declarer ruffed in dummy and North overruffed and played the ♦7 forcing out declarer's last trump and scoring the ♣10 at the end for five down, -1100.



Then declarer must cash the ♣AKQ, cross to dummy with the ♠K and play the ♣10 when East has no defence.





Unsurprisingly none of the NS pairs ventured 3NT and none of the East players found the killing club lead against 4♥.

Most of them led the ♠K, setting up the ♠J as declarer's tenth trick. Franceschetti received the lead of the ♥6. Now the only chance of making 4♥ seems to find the ♣10 with West. Not wanting to rely on that, the Frenchman embarked on an elimination play. He took two rounds of trumps, cashed the ♠A, cashed the ace and king of diamonds and ruffed a diamond.

He exited with the spade 9, won by East who continued with the ♠K. Franceschetti ruffed and had reached this ending:



By now he had a complete count of the hand. He knew West had started with a 3=2=6=2 so he played the ♣Q from hand, guaranteeing the contract. East won with the king and continued with the ♣2. Franceschetti played low from dummy and claimed when West produced the ace. Putting up the jack would have made no difference as West was endplayed. Plus 420 gained 7 IMPs as at the other table NS rested in 3♥, which was just made.

Where are you from, where do you live, what is your age and relationship status?

- Hi, Christina ⊕. I'm from Brazil, living in Barcelona for more or less 15 years. I'm married to my love, Alana Neri.

Give us the highlights of your background.

- I changed schools a lot when I was young because my father was a journalist and we kept on moving from São Paulo - where I was born - to Rio and the other way around. We also lived twice in Brasília, which is Brazil's capital. Later I started to study law at the University, but after a year I noticed it was not what I expected and started working in the commodities market, especially with electrical energy brokerage. After I moved to Spain I decided to be a full-time time Bridge Pro and musician. I played poker for a while, but it's a game too passive for me; having to fold many hands can be pretty boring... I also have a band called The Madalyns and we've been playing in Rio de Janeiro and Barcelona. If you know of some serious rock gig in Denmark, we're ready

- I didn't see myself in as a broker or a trader forever, even though I was good at it. So, I had to make a decision of which way to take and since I was already a bridge expert with some important titles, I figured out it was the moment to take it seriously. It was easier for me to move to Spain because my mother is from Barcelona and I have the Spanish nationality thanks to her.

What is the best and worst about the two countries?

- The best of Brazil is our people - they are friendly, caring and ready to help anyone in need. Also the great majority is honest and hard working.

Spain is a very nice place to live, the cultural and social aspects are great and most of the time people are educated and kind. The worst part is that we still have some Franco supporters, we call them "fachas", and we are better off without them for good.

How did you begin to play bridge?
