# The Wild Wild West

In Round 4 I spotted a several deals where the bidding had some significance.

#### Board 1. Dealer North. None Vul.


I can think of two possibilities for West. They both start with the letter P. However, there is a school of thought that advocates making a takeout double with this type of hand.

When that was exactly what happened at the table I happened to be watching I thought it would be a worthwhile exercise to see if anyone else though it was a good idea.

In fact, the opening bid of 1♦ was doubled three times (and 1♣ was doubled once). The only demonstrably poor result came after North redoubled and East bid spades and then hearts over South's 2♣, which encouraged West to double 3♣ resulting in -470.

One day someone may convince me that doubling with a balanced hand with around 25% of your values in the opener's suit is a good idea, but it will be a long time coming.

This was the full deal:




#### Board 4. Dealer West, All Vul.

♠ 6♥ A 4 2♦ A K Q J 10 8 5 3♣ 2

The first question is what is the West hand worth?

The Kaplan-Rubens Hand Evaluator rates it 21.60, while the Danny Kleinman HCP evaluation is 15. It contains nine cast-iron winners so it certainly has potential. What's the best way to proceed?

Three players started with 2♣, six with one diamond and one with a strong 1♣.

There were 12 tricks when North led the ♥J. They lost 13 IMPs as one of the pairs to make 6♦ were playing against their teammates.

7 pairs advanced as far as 6♦ and three of them of them made it - twice North led the A and then the play diverged, one trying a second club, the other switching to the ♥3. When East was declarer South led the ♠K.

#### 3♠ Good preempt

1♠ was not a universal choice - everyone else started with 1♦. What would you bid now with South's hand?


If partner's good preempt could be based on AQxx then you need a way to investigate for a grand slam. When I was a lad jumping to 5NT was the Grand Slam Force, asking about the three top trumps. When I played with Sandra Landy we used step responses, 6♣ none, 6♦ one, 6♥ two, 6♠ three.

Nowadays everyone seems to prefer to use 5NT as 'pick a slam' but there is no sense in that in this situation.
South was content with 6♠ and East


judged to go on to 7♥.

Versace-Alpert and Pellegrini-Rocca also saved in 7♥ - one of them discovering that their teammates had sold out to 6♥X.



One South bid 5NT after the bidding started 1♦-(1♥)-Dble promising 4 or 5♠.

North responded 6♠ and played there for a flat board.



#### 2♥ Transfer

South led the ♥A and when North followed with the seven he cashed the king and exited with the ♦5. Declarer won with the ten, North following with the nine, and cashed the ♠A. When South produced the queen, declarer cashed the ♠AK pitching a club from dummy, ruffed the ♥Q and played three rounds of clubs, ruffing, to reach this position:



Declarer played the ◆5 and when South produced the ♥6 he claimed, +620 and a 12 IMP swing.

Dates: February 22-24

Time: 11:00 Eastern time/17:00 CET - 3:00/21:00

Format: Matchpoints. Two days of qualification followed by A- and B-finals.

1/3 of the field will qualify for the A-final.

Entry fee: 100 euro/120 dollars for three days of play (juniors half price)

Boards 30-32 boards/day depending on number of participants. Either with a small

break halfway through the event or enough time to go get a snack or coffee.

Platform: RealBridge (realbridge.online)

Registration: mmt.bridgeresults.org

Beginners as well as world class players are equally welcome.

We will have bulletins as you know them from the Monthly Mixed Teams, the same result software and a top EBL tournament director.

We have tested running events on RealBridge and would like to try this platform for the Monthly Mixed Pairs. We believe that though many like playing without shaving or doing their hair, meeting and chatting to so many opponents will add a social element.

It is also possible to mute the audio and turn off the camera while getting coffee (or using the restroom as dummy) to limit the invasion of your privacy.

We realize that many may not have not tried RealBridge before, but it is very easy and untuitive, and a profile is not even required. You simply log on via a link provided by us and play. The event will not be open to kibitzers.

*In which country and to which women does your heart belong?* 


