Flying Starts



The first session of the semifinals saw a team in each match build up a significant lead.

First we take a look at Turkish National Mix vs. Austerlitz:

East led the ♠3 and declarer won with the ace, played a spade to the king and the ♥10, covered by the king and ducked. West returned the ♥7 and declarer won with

the ace, cashed the A, ruffed a club, drew trumps and tried the hearts, which added up to eight tricks, -200.

The simple approach is to draw trumps and then hope to score three heart tricks along with a club and a diamond. That would have worked on this layout.

East led the ♥2 for the nine, king and ace and declarer played back a heart, East winning with the jack and switching to the ♣4 for the king and ace. Declarer cashed winners and finished with ten tricks, +630 and 13 IMPs.

In the other semifinal Just Spinnin vs. Strawberries both pairs reached the safe haven of 3NT. We switch to that match:

South led the ♥J and declarer won with the ace and played three rounds of diamonds ending in dummy, South discarding the ♥10 and the ♠9. When a spade to the queen lost the contract was two down, -100 and 14 IMPs changed hands.


South led the heart jack to declarer's ace. There was no heart discard this time so when declarer took the spade finesse he was three down, -150.



West led the ◆8 and declarer won with the queen and played the ♥10, West taking the ace and returning the ◆5. East ruffed and switched to the ♠K which declarer won, following it with two rounds of clubs. East could win and cash the ♠Q, but declarer claimed the rest, +110.

Dble Hearts

West led the ♠8 for the queen and ace and declarer played the ♥10, West taking the ace and playing a second spade. Having won with the a king East switched to the ♦J declarer winning with dummy's ace and playing off the top hearts discarding diamonds. West ruffed cashed the ♦K and continued with the ten. Declarer could ruff with dummy's ♣7 and then run the nine, one down, -100 and a 5 IMP loss.


Both sides had missed a difficult chance; If East ruffs the ◆K and exits with the ♥J declarer will have to lose a trick to the ♣Q and be two down. Having taken the ◆A if declarer guesses to run the ♥9 she can then play two rounds of trumps and will be able to enjoy dummy's hearts.

Strawberries had outscored Just Spinnin 58-14.1, while Turkish National Mix were leading Austerlitz 55.1-22.

In the second set the Strawberries built their lead to 102-33.1, and Just Spinnin resigned with 16 boards to go.

Austerlitz fought for their life against the Turkish in the third segment, but to no avail despite 10 IMPs from this board.

Brigitte Aubonnet led the ♣7, her partner winning the ace and returning a diamond. East cleared the suit, and in with the ♠A, West could cash the setting diamond. 3NT made in the other room after an inspired ♦Q-lead.

The final result was 127.1-95 for Turkish National Mix, ready for the Strawberries in today's final.


A Triple Squeeze

One of the most interesting deals of the 2021 February Mixed Teams was Board 1 from Round 3:

Dealer North. None Vul.



North has a six loser hand. Five players decided to open 1♠, one opened 2♠ (8-11) and the other four entered the bidding at a later stage to show both majors.

All NS pairs ended in a game contract: six in 4♥, two in 4♠ and two in 3NT. Double dummy only 4♥ can be made.

Twice West led a club against 4♥. Declarer can discard his diamond loser, give up a spade, ruff a spade high, draw two rounds of trumps and run the spades. All he will lose is a spade and two hearts.

Cenk Tunkoç cashed the ♥K before ducking a spade. When East overtook the ♠9 with the jack to play a trump, declarer emerged with an overtrick.

Carlos Pellegrini drew king and queen of hearts and could no longer win the contract.

Four times a diamond was led. Now 4♥ can only be made on double dummy lines. Thomas Bessis, Ish Delmonte, Daniel Eriksson and Martine Rossard all went down.

David Gold and Sedat Aluf were allowed to make 4♠. If East leads a top diamond and then switches to a club (or to the ♥2), declarer will lose a diamond, two spades and a heart.


Alfredo Versace had less to go on. He also tried to cash a second diamond trick, expecting it to be the only way to possibly beat 4.


Both Patrick Bogacki and Hilda Setton hit upon the unfortunate lead of a small club. Now 3NT is cold as Renée Verdegaal demonstrated.

After winning the first trick with \$9 she played a small spade. Sauvage rose with the king and cashed the \$AK. She continued with the \$J to South's queen. A spade to the ace was followed by a heart to the king. Declarer cashed the \$A\$ to reach this ending:




She needed four of the remaining five tricks. On the ♣K a spade was discarded from dummy and East was caught in a triple squeeze. Hoping her partner held the ♦9 she threw the ♦10. Verdegaal now scored the ♦9 and two heart tricks for a splendid plus 400.

Kay Enfield also played a spade from dummy in trick two but was treated to a tougher defense by Pierre Franceschetti.



After winning with the ♠K he shifted to the ♦J. Enfield put up the queen, played a spade to the ace and a heart to the queen. When she cashed her top clubs East was squeezed out his ♦10. This was the ending:



Enfield cashed the ♥K and was one off.
East's take-out double over 1♠ and the fall of the ♥J should have made declarer suspect hearts were 4-1. A diamond will endplay East. If a spade was discarded from dummy, he can cash the ♠J, but he cannot afford to cash a second diamond as this will set up the ♦9. So he exits with the ♥10. South wins with the king and again endplays East with another diamond, forcing him to lead into the ♥A8 in dummy.
