## **Sparkling Start**

The final of the February Mixed Teams was between Turkish National Mix and Strawberries, the former carrying forward a lead of 0.1. It featured some top class play and defence.

### 1♠ Denies four spades

West cashed the top hearts and then played two rounds of spades. Declarer could not avoid the loss of a diamond and two trumps so that was four down, -800.



Declarer won the club lead with dummy's ace and played the ◆J. South took the ace and switched to the ♥3,but declarer won, ruffed a diamond, drew trumps and claimed, +420 but a loss of 9 IMPs.

#### 1♠ Diamonds

East led the ♥6 and declarer won with the jack and ran the ♣9, West winning with the jack and switching to the ◆2. Declarer put up the queen and cashed four rounds of clubs, pitching three diamonds as West parted with a diamond and a heart and East a heart and a spade. A spade to the queen lost to the ace and East returned a spade, declarer taking dummy's king and played the ♥K. East ducked that, but could claim the last three tricks, one down, -100.

In the four card ending, declarer must exit with a spade. East wins but dummy will score two more tricks. If West had returned a heart as opposed to a diamond then declarer would have had no chance. If declarer plays a club to the ace at trick two

and then plays a spade to the queen the defenders have no real chance of defeating the contract.



East led the ♥6 and declarer won with dummy's nine and played a spade to the queen and ace. He won the return of the ♥4 in hand and ran the ♣8 to West's queen. When a diamond came back he put in the queen and played a spade for the eight and jack. West exited with a club and declarer cashed his winners in the suit and in the three-card ending he exited with the ♥K. East could win, but was forced to lead into dummy's ♠K9.

A delightful piece of play that garnered 12 IMPs.

South led the ♠A and switched to the ♥K. Declarer won with the ace and led the ♦4, ducking when South followed with the six. There was no way to avoid the loss of four trumps and the ♣A which added up to four down, -1100.

You see how complex bridge has become when East, facing an opening bid, cannot double 4.

West led the ♥8 and East won with the ace and returned the four, declarer ruffing and playing the ♦6. West went up with the ace and continued with the ♥J which declarer ruffed.


When he exited with the ♣10 West took the jack and switched to the ♠8 for the queen and ace and declarer played the ♠7, East winning with the king and playing the ♥Q. Declarer ruffed, drew trumps and exited with a club.

East won with the queen, but had to lead a diamond giving dummy the last two tricks, two down, -200 and 16 IMPs.

If East exits with the ♣Q as opposed to the ♥Q, the defenders get another trick.

South led the ♣Q and continued with the ♣4, declarer ruffing with the ♥J and drawing trumps ending in dummy.



A diamond to the queen lost to the ace and South returned the three. Declarer won with dummy's king, played a spade to the queen, cashed the ace and exited with a spade.

North had to win and offer up a ruff and discard, +420.

Not the first well played hand of the event by this declarer.

#### 3♦ Mixed raise

South led the \$Q for the king and ace and North switched to the \$J. When the queen held, declarer drew trumps ending in dummy, ruffed a club high and played a diamond to the king and second diamond. South overtook North's ten with the jack, cashed the ace and exited with the nine, declarer conceding one down, -50 and 10 IMPs that saw Strawberries take the first of the three sessions to lead 46-30.1.

The Strawberries had the seating rights in the second set, and they decided to let the love birds Bessis-Baroni have another dance with the fine Turkish pair Namik Kökten - Tuna Aluf. Not only the bridge was at an excellent level, also the atmosphere.

Barsis is what Irene Baroni and Thomas Bessis like to call themselves, yet there are many other combinations, like Baronessis (my personal favourite). For the ones not aware, they are engaged to marry this summer, and every time they play together, the wedding guests are holding their breath. Yesterday was a good day for those of us hoping the wedding will take place.

Bessis --> bien joué mon petit lapin ♥
Baroni --> merci ♥
Bessis --> bonne chance ma ptite bouchère
d'amour ♥
Baroni --> ahahah
(Translation: "Well played my little bunny"

At this point Tuna Aluf joined the conversation - in French, mind you - while her partner was thinking.


and "Good luck my butcher of love")

Now Kökten had heard enough. Kökten --> don't know French but I take my time again

The first big swing for Turkey came on board 3.



Tuna Aluf entered the auction with double for the minors, and that was not taken lightly by her partner. Bessis had not given up hope of a grand, so he jumped to 6♣.

The French chatting, vulnerability and knowledge of his opponent's club void tempted Kökten to correctly save in 7.

Bessis led the ♠K and shifted to a heart. Knowing the club layout, Kökten knew not to try the ♣Q to pin the stiff jack and was three off, -500.




At the other table Kutuk-Kizilok had an uncontested route to slam.

2♣ was a variant of Gazzilli, either a weak 6-card heart suit or 16+. 2♦ showed 8+ any, 2♥ confirmed the weak hearts hand, but that did not make Kizilok less excited. 4♣ was shortness, and over his 4♥ decline he pushed on with 4♠, clearly looking for the diamond cuebid, which his partner rewarded him by showing.

+1430 meant 14 IMPs for Turkey, tying the match. The next 10 boards were 20-15 for Turkey, taking the lead, until Pierre Franceschetti found an inspired 3NT-bid.

East led the ♠7 and declarer quickly claimed 10 tricks, +630.

So what prompted North to bid 3NT? First of all, it looks the most likely game and he likes to declare. Furthermore, 2♥ was not supported, and even if partner has no heart stopper in her own hand, combined with the queen it might make up for one, like this holding or Txxx.

The moment East decides not to lead a small heart, a heart honor to see dummy would be the best lead. In this case it would make the diamond switch easy, and EW would cash the first 6 tricks.

Franceschetti's bravery was rewarded with 10 IMPs, when North-South at the other table did their best, but could not compete with 630.

South had an awkward problem after the double of 3♥. After thinking long, she passed, which netted her side +200.

She led the \$\frac{1}{4}\$ to the queen, and North cashed the \$\frac{1}{4}\$A and played a spade to South's queen. She cashed the king, on which North played the \$\frac{1}{4}\$A, trying to signal for a spade, but South could not see declarer's singleton and might not have expected her partner to hold seven clubs, so she continued a club.

On this layout it did not matter, as she had a natural heart trick when her partner held the queen, but had she held JTx, playing a fourth spade would promote an extra trick for the defence.

The second set ended 39-26 for Turkey, meaning the French were up 72-69.1 before the last 16 boards.

They built the lead with 10 more IMPs during the first five boards, but then Irene Baroni faced this lead problem:



Irene opted for a low spade. She received the maximum punishment when dummy was this:

Declarer now guessed to cash the ♠AK and had enough entries via club ruffs for lead hearts towards her hand to set up a diamond dsicard (the other went on the ♣K). A lucky +1430 meant 13 IMPs for Turkey and combined with three partscore swings it was enough to secure the Turkish victory 102.1-91 after a close and well-fought final.

Format: Matchpoints. Two days of qualification followed by A- and B-finals.

1/3 of the field will qualify for the A-final.

Entry fee: 100 euro/120 dollars for three days of play (juniors half price)

Boards 30-32 boards/day depending on number of participants. Either with a small

break halfway through the event or enough time to go get a snack or coffee.

Platform: RealBridge (realbridge.online)

Registration: mmt.bridgeresults.org

Beginners as well as world class players are equally welcome.

We will have bulletins as you know them from the Monthly Mixed Teams, the same result software and a top EBL tournament director.

We have tested running events on RealBridge and would like to try this platform for the Monthly Mixed Pairs. We believe that though many like playing without shaving or doing their hair, meeting and chatting to so many opponents will add a social element.

It is also possible to mute the audio and turn off the camera while getting coffee (or using the restroom as dummy) to limit the invasion of your privacy.

We realize that many may not have not tried RealBridge before, but it is very easy and untuitive, and a profile is not even required. You simply log on via a link provided by us and play. The event will not be open to kibitzers.

If the tournament is a success, we plan to repeat the Monthly Mixed Pairs April 26-28 and perhaps a weekend, depending on your feedback in terms of format, times and wishes.
