

Here are three deals from the first session of the semifinals. Can you spot the theme that links them?

East led the ♠A and declarer ruffed and ducked a heart, West winning with the ten and returning the ♠Q. Declarer ruffed, cashed the ♣A and claimed the rest, +950.

Declarer ruffed the spade lead and cashed the ♣A, soon claiming 12 tricks, +620, but a loss of 8 IMPs.

West is sure to bid spades - the opening bid is a matter of taste. EW have a good save in spades, but don't want to push too hard, as if NS get to 6♣ they are likely to make it.



South has the first decision - to open 1♥ or 1NT. Then if West overcalls there is a chance that NS might reach 6♣.



East led the ◆3 and declarer won with the ace, took two rounds of trumps and then played a heart for the queen and ace. West returned the ◆J and East ruffed, but now had a choice of losing options - to open up the frozen spade suit or lead a heart. The ◆J saw declarer claim, +600.

West led the •Q and declarer won with dummy's ace, played two rounds of trumps ending in dummy and then played a heart for the queen and ace. West diamond return meant the contract was one down and when East exited with a low spade declarer tried dummy's queen and the end result was three down, -300 and a 14 IMP swing.

Having taken the opening lead suppose declarer draws trumps and then cashes three more clubs. This will be the position:

Declarer plays a heart to the ten and ace and West exits with a diamond. Declarer wins and cashes the ♥KQ, squeezing West in the pointed suits. Not easy, but aided by West's overcall it might be possible.

West led the ♦Q and declarer won in hand, cashed the ♣K and continued with the ♥Q. When that held he cashed the remaining clubs, West coming under pressure and discarding a spectacular ♥A. Declarer cashed the ♦A and then guessed to play a low spade for the queen and king, so that was +630.

East led the ♥3 and declarer won with the ace pitching a spade, played a diamond to the queen, cashed the ♣A, then took the ♦A and ruffed a diamond. A spade to the ace was followed by another diamond ruff and a claim, +1370.

In passing I'll mention that West had various options after 2NT, including bidding $3 \checkmark / 4 \checkmark$, which can sometimes result in a good save being found.

The lead of the ◆8 was taken by the queen and South cashed the ace and continued with the three, North pitching the ◆8 when declarer ruffed with the ♥10. The ♥2 was covered by the eight and jack and South threw the ♣7. Declarer pitched a club on the ◆K as North ruffed.

Playing hearts now should lead to three down, but North exited with the ♣3 and South won with the king and continued with the ace. Declarer ruffed and played a spade for the queen and ace. South played the ◆10 and when declarer ruffed with the ♥Q (a spade is best) North discarded the ♣9.

The ♠K saw North ruff and he could cash the ♥A and score the last two tricks for -500 and 8 IMPs.

Did you spot the theme? On all three deals NS might bid 6♣.

Before the third segment Turnips were leading Just Sippin by slightly more than their 10.1 carry-over; however in the third segment the Turnips outgrew Just Sippin to win by 50 IMPs, 133.1-83.

Medium Rare put up more fight against our defending champions Parker, but in the end the American/Italian alliance scored 133, while Medium Rare only took 114.1 including their 6.1 VP carry-over.

The final is the first for Hilda Setton's fruit and vegetable team and the second in a row for Parker.
