
The Ides of June

Board 3. Dealer South. EW Vul.









From the comfort of my office it is easy for me to suggest that North should play for penalties on the basis that if you can take ten tricks in spades you will presumably collect 300/500 from 4♠ doubled.

East led the ♥Q and declarer won with dummy's ace, came to hand with a diamond and played a spade to the king. When that lost West cashed the ♥J and continued with the ♥3. East ruffed with the ♥J and returned the ♣6, West's ruff meaning the contract was two down, -100.

This was the only occasion West opened 4♥.




East's 2♣ worked well. North might have bid 2♠ over 2♥, but it's not a clear cut action.

North led the \$4 and declarer won with the queen and played a heart for the queen and ace, soon claiming eight tricks, +110.






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
