## Semifinal 1



In both semifinals of the Summer Mixed one team started with a significant carry-over of 0.1. That meant that if they could keep their opponents off the scorecard for 28 deals (a bridge equivalent of Baseball's 'Perfect Game') they didn't need to score a single IMP themselves.

Casting that whimsical thought aside, here are three deals from the first session:

The defenders could score a club and diamond, but declarer had 10 tricks, +620.





I recall being told that when you have both majors opposite a 1NT opening you have a better than 50% chance of finding partner with a major. With this particular hand had East elected to pass the forced redouble it would have been interesting to see what South would have done (as the cards lie 1NT by West cannot be defeated). South led the ♣2 and North won with the



queen and played two rounds of spades. Declarer played three rounds of diamonds discarding a club from dummy, but South ruffed and returned the ♣J, missing the opportunity to give North a spade ruff. However, when declarer failed to cover South switched to the ♠10 and returned the ◆J, ruffed and overruffed by South who played another spade which meant the penalty was -800.

Declarer pitched a club from hand (nothing is better) and South's club switch meant the contract was three down, -300 but still a swing of 11 IMPs.

cashed the ♥Q. When the jack fell declarer played safely for ten tricks, drawing the outstanding trump and playing on diamonds, +420.



West led the ◆5 for the king and ace and declarer returned the jack. When it held she played a heart to the ten and jack, ducked the switch to the ♠Q, won the next spade in dummy and played the ♥Q. If West had ducked declarer would have been in trouble, but she took the ace and played a spade, declarer cashing her tricks for +90, still an 8 IMP loss.

This type of deal, where entries are a problem is always awkward to play. On this layout declarer must win the first round of spades and play the \$\int\_J\$. If East wins with the queen and plays a spade declarer ducks, wins the next spade and now plays hearts. West wins the third round, but will have to surrender two tricks to declarer.

The late surge of IMPs gave Marlenka a half-time lead of 35.1-26.






