# **Summer Storms**

In second we find Donner with 28.52, and the two teams face each other in the first match today. Less than 1 VP separates the teams placed 3-5 (Turnips, McLaughlin and Israel Mixed) and the rest are waiting for their chance to attack.

After receiving your feedback we have decided to play one round of Danish after the 7 Round Robin-matches. This means 1 plays 2, 3 plays 4 etc. All results will count in the total, which means that the final ranking for all teams is decided after the Danish.



All players should enter BBO 5 minutes before the beginning of a match. TD Denis Dobrin will instruct you where to sit. All players must have their name in their BBO-profile. Private isn't allowed for the sake of opponents and kibitzers.

# **A Last Minute Psych**

Elly Schippers-Bosklopper from the Netherlands won her first medal, a bronze one, at the European Championships of 1979 in Lausanne. After winning the European Women Pairs with Marijke van der Pas in 1980, she collected six more medals (four silver and two bronze) at various European and World Championships.

After retiring from the Dutch women team Schippers represented The Netherlands in the seniors on several occasions. Playing with her late husband Henk, Jan-Willem Bomhof and Roald Ramer she won a bronze medal at the 2002 World Championships.

Schippers has now turned her attention to the mixed, hoping to expand her already impressive trophies collection. She seized the opportunity to practice with her partner René Stienen against strong opponents by accepting a last minute invitation to participate in the tenth edition of the Monthly Mixed Teams.

As the other two pairs of the Dutch mixed team were not available, Schippers-Stienen teamed up with Johan Hammelev-Camilla Krefeld and Jens Ove Henneberg-Marlene


Henneberg who will represent Denmark at the EBL Qualifier.

The "Dutch Danes" had a splendid first day, leading the field with 33.57 VPs after two matches. Elly Schippers is known as a solid



player who shies away from frivolous actions. Therefore, I was surprised to see her launch a psych at the very first board of the tournament.

Her third hand 1♠ opener was right on target. West doubled and Stienen had an easy raise to 4♠, pushing the opponents to the five level. Against 5♦ doubled North led the ♥A, followed by the ♥K and the ♥4 for his partner to ruff: plus 100.

At the other table NS remained silent and Hammelev-Krefeld had a free run to 4♥, making after the ♣10 lead by North. Another plus 420 and 11 IMPs to the Dutch Danes.






The latest edition of the Mixed Teams attracted eight teams – and some star names.

Both deals in this article presented a lead problem worth a 2-digit IMP-swing.

#### Board 1. Dealer North. None Vul.



To have any chance of defeating 4♥ North has to find a spade lead (or cash a top heart and then switch to a spade).

South's tactical effort led to East being declarer.

The opening lead was the ◆10 and when declarer played low from dummy North ruffed with the ♥4 and switched to the ♠10. Declarer won with dummy's ace, cashed the ♣A pitching a spade and ran the ♣Q, discarding a second spade. When his majesty took the trick the top trumps meant -50.

Here North responded to the opening bid and the spade fit was located enabling South to find the lead of the ♠7.

Declarer took dummy's ace and played the ♥J. North won with the ace and switched to the ♣10 which meant that declarer could dispose of two spades and score ten tricks, losing only two hearts and a diamond and collecting 10 IMPs.

If North returns a spade at trick three South wins but must then switch to a diamond. That might be easier if North drops the ♠Q under the ace and then returns the ♠8.


If declarer covers the opening lead with dummy's nine North has to win and the defenders are helpless. However, South can remove this option by leading the •K! If declarer ducks in dummy North can send a message with the •Q.





EW have 7♥ – but having it is one thing, reaching it is another matter.



It was a 13 IMP swing on the road the 42-8 IMP-victory for the Dutch Danes in the battle of the players competing in the upcoming European online qualification.

It should be mentioned the 17 IMPs were Parker's only consolation in a match McLaughlin won 60-18.

I consulted a couple of learned works about the meaning of this sequence – one of them remained silent, the other suggesting it promised eight playing tricks with at least six hearts. I can't see any reason for East to bid on – can you? The only possible alternative for West appears to be a rebid of 2♠ (unless you think a rebid of 4♣ should be 'self-splinter').

It meant we had another 17 IMP swing for Donner ending in a blitz 96-19.



I suspect both EW pairs were happy to discover they had a flat board. As you saw, it was easier to reach 7♥ when East opened the bidding – but not quite a racing certainty.

The Romans landed a victory of 41-39, our only square match this round.
