

I would not dream of including an account of any such deals in my report, but I do like to cover those where swings are the order of the day. Which brings us to Round 3.

With the ♥A onside 6♣ is the place to be, but there is no obvious scientific route to that contract.

South has many possibilities over East's opening bid. Apart from the double a simple overcall of 2. (intending to introduce the spades later) and a two-suited overcall. On the second round it looks tempting to double, but introducing the clubs is also a possibility. I'm still searching for an adjective to describe North's conversion.

Declarer ruffed the club lead in dummy and played a heart to the queen, South winning and returning the ♥2. Declarer won with dummy's ace, played a diamond to the ace and a spade, soon claiming, +380 and the small matter of 18 IMPs.


Have you noticed that the blue card in the bidding box is not used that often? I would have been sorely tempted to redouble with South's hand when West would have come to the rescue by bidding 5 ♦.

East's double might fall into the category of the 'stripe-tailed ape' but opposite an opening bid it is not obvious that the opponents have a slam.

(A stripe tailed ape double is a strategic double of an opposing game contract. The doubler actually expects that the opponents can make a slam, but hopes they'll settle for the doubled game score. Should the opponents redouble the contract, conventional wisdom recommends running like a "stripe-tailed ape" to a sacrificial contract./ed.)

The overtrick meant the score was +950 which translated into 8 IMPs.

However, 6♥ can be defeated by a spade lead. 6NT by East is untouchable, but unlikely – unless the bidding is revealing.




There is good argument to use 4♣ in this situation as keycard, but it is matter of taste.

North led the ♣6 and declarer took South's ten with the king and played the ♠4 for the six, queen and ten.

Declarer took two rounds of trumps ending in hand and played a second spade to the eight and nine. South exited with the ♥3 and when declarer won with the ace she was a trick short. I suspect a 'mouse-click' but it was a loss of 14 IMPs.


