In the OCBL Group things were much tighter. Table topping Friends were unbeaten, but the pack was close behind with all to play for.

played two rounds of spades for two down, -300.

South led a club as before but here North switched to a spade at trick two and the defenders played three rounds of the suit, establishing dummy's jack. Declarer ruffed, went to dummy with the ♥A to pitch a diamond on the ♠J, took the ♥K, eliminated the clubs and threw South in with a heart, forcing a lead into the diamond tenace, one down, -50 and 6 IMPs.

In the OCBL Group the contract ranged from 3NT (down 2) to 5♥ doubled.

Everyone in the ALT Group played in hearts, the range being between 2♥ and 4♥ doubled.

Kamil Nowak made 3♥ doubled when the defenders played three rounds of spades after taking the ♣A.

East led the ♠3 and when dummy's ten held declarer played a spade to the queen, West taking the king and switching to the ♥5 for the king and ace. Declarer took the ♥J with the queen and with clubs 3-3 he had nine tricks, +600 and 12 IMPs.

If East somehow finds a diamond lead West wins and switches to a heart putting the defenders one step ahead.

If South is the declarer a heart lead should be fatal.

5 pairs tried 3NT in the OCBL Group, only one of them was defeated (North had opened 1♣ and East overcalled 1♦ and led the suit, West – Starkowski - switching to a heart.)

4 ALT pairs were in 3NT, Randy Howard and Bill Hall being the only pair to defeat it via a diamond lead and a heart switch.

Declarer took North's spade lead with the ace, ruffed a spade and played a heart to the king. When a club to the king held declarer ruffed a club, ruffed a spade and ruffed a club with the $\diamond Q$, North overruffing and exiting with a heart. Declarer took dummy's ace, ruffed a club high, and played the $\heartsuit 10$ which was now high, South having pitched the queen on the fourth round of spades. South ruffed with the $\diamond 8$ and exited with a club, declarer ruffing with the $\diamond 7$ for ten tricks, +130.

North led the $\spadesuit 4$ for the queen and ace and when declarer played the $\clubsuit 5$ North took the ace and switched to the $\heartsuit 8$, declarer winning with the ten and playing the $\diamond K$. North took that and exited with the $\clubsuit 3$ for the nine, ten and a ruff. Declarer ruffed a spade, played a heart to the king and ruffed a spade. When declarer pitched a spade on the $\clubsuit K$ North ruffed and exited with a heart, locking declarer in dummy and ensuring a trick for the $\diamond J$ for two down, -500 and a 12 IMP swing. A dentist would have cashed the $\heartsuit A$ before playing the $\clubsuit K$, saving a trick.

It proved to a low scoring round in the ALT Group, which suited Uli who were almost certain to advance. Rippey would need a win while hoping that Uli could defeat Crocodile by a big margin.

Things were tighter in the OCBL Group, with third placed Friends needing a helping hand.
