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
Turnips Top Tight Field



Round 5 & 6



It was a miserable day in Shrewsbury, cold and with constant rain. Then came the news that the Russian Bridge League team for the Venice Cup had withdrawn and the WBF Management Committee were meeting to discuss the participation of the Russian team in the Wuhan Cup. With European air space closed it is hard to see how either team could hope to travel to Italy in any event.

To lighten the gloom, I decided to concentrate on unusual results on what appeared to be straightforward deals. Here are some of the (many) available examples from Round 5:

Board 2. Dealer East. NS Vul.



This looks like a routine 3NT where a spade lead will cook declarer's goose. However, only six pairs reached it.


East's raise may have been weak, but it ensured that West would lead the suit. (As a corollary, some partnerships use a redouble at this point to indicate the possession of a high honour, the idea being to help partner to judge the opening lead.) Declarer ducked, won the second round with dummy's king and ran the ♣10, West winning and clearing the spades by returning the queen. Declarer crossed to dummy by overtaking the ♦Q and played the ♣9 for the jack and king and then continued with a club, East winning, cashing another club and exiting with the ♥5. Declarer can cash out for two down but hoping for a minor miracle she cashed the ♦K and then played a heart which meant she was three down. -300.

West decided to lead the ♥J, but it did not produce the desired result. Declarer won with the queen, crossed to dummy with a diamond and ran the ♣10, West winning with theace and exiting with a diamond.

Declarer won with dummy's jack, played a club to the king and a heart for the ten and ace. She returned to hand with a spade and played a heart to set up a ninth trick, +600 and 14 IMPs.

Board 6. Dealer East. EW Vul.



Another routine 3NT where the defenders have no way in which to trouble declarer. That contract was reached ten times.

If you are not playing 'garbage Stayman' then North might redouble to suggest the possibility of playing there.

West led the ◆10 and declarer won with the jack and ducked a club to East's seven. The diamond return was taken by dummy's king and declarer overtook the ♠J and played a club for the nine and jack, East discarding the ◆3. Declarer unblocked the spades and now has more than one way to secure a useful redoubled overtrick. The safest is to play dummy's ♥K catering for the possibility that East started with the ace. If it holds declarer can play two rounds of clubs and will score a ninth trick with the ♥Q.

When declarer played a heart to the queen West could win and return a heart, restricting declarer to her contract, +560.


2♣ redoubled was reached at a table in the match between March Hares and Coast 2 Coast, but declarer could not find a route to nine tricks.

East led the ♦6 for the eight, ten and king and declarer cashed the ♠Q and then played a heart for the queen and ace, West returning the ♣10. Declarer took the ace, unblocked the spades, played a diamond to the jack and cashed out for nine tricks, +400 but a 4 IMP loss.

Board 8. Dealer West. None Vul.



Another deal where 3NT would be the nap selection. It was reached eight times and only failed once.


Overcalling 2. is fine, but East went to the well once to often.

South started with two rounds of hearts and declarer won with dummy's king and played a spade. North took the ace, cashed the ♥Q and switched to a diamond, South taking two tricks in the suit and exiting with a spade. That left declarer with nothing but trumps and meant four down, -800.

East led the *K and declarer took the ace, played a diamond to the queen and cashed the ace, discarding a club. She ruffed a diamond, East overruffing with the nine and switching to a heart.

This is a critical moment for declarer. The winning line is to take dummy's ace, play a spade to the ace and continue with the \$J. If East covers declarer ruffs in dummy, ruffs a diamond, and pitches a heart on the \$10. West can ruff, but can only score one more trick.




This is not easy to see and declarer played low allowing West to take the ♥K. Now the ♦J is a killer, but West returned a heart and declarer won with dummy's ace and played a spade to the ace. She cashed the ♥Q and now needs to play on clubs, an analogous line to the one described earlier, but when she continued with a heart West could ruff and exit with the ♦J ensuring a trick for the ♠J, -50 and a 13 IMP swing.

On Board 12 North held ♠ AJ1095 ♥AJ974 ♦ - ♣832 and saw West open 1NT.

2♣ to show the majors was followed by 3NT from East and North had to find a lead. The ten players who faced this problem all led the ♠J. Those familiar with the dictates of the famous English twins Bob and Jim Sharples would have led a heart (with an equal choice between the majors lead a heart).

Partner had KQ5 in one of the majors.

This looks like a routine 4♠ for EW, and that contract was reached 10 times.

There is a school of though that suggest that East's 4♣ should promise clubs and a major, but I cannot tell you if it was operating here. Declarer recorded 11 tricks, +150.

North led the ◆Q to dummy's ace and declarer immediately played a club, South taking the ace and switching to the ◆3 (the ♥J might have given declarer pause for thought) declarer winning with dummy's king and cashing the queen.




When North discarded declarer turned to clubs. South ruffed the fourth round of the suit and declarer overruffed, cashed the A, ruffed a diamond, cashed two clubs and took the heart finesse for a majestic +1430 and 15 IMPs.

Tell it not in Gath, but one player had the misfortune to go no less than three down in 4♠!

Let's move on to Round 6:

This appears to be a modest part-score deal for EW.

North led the \$\ 8\$ and after three rounds of the suit declarer won with dummy's queen and played on hearts, soon claiming nine tricks, +110.


South took a risk by overcalling with such a modest suit.

West led the ♥Q and declarer won with the ace and played the ♣2, West taking the jack and playing a second heart to declarer's king. The game of ping-pong continued with a club being taken by West's king and he switched to the ♠3 for the eight, queen and king. When declarer played a spade West took the king and exited with the two, East winning with the ten and cashing the ♥J. East cashed the ♠A and continued with the jack and when declarer discarded a diamond she was three down, -500 and 9 IMPs the poorer.

North led the ♠7 and South won with the jack and found the unfortunate switch to the \$2 which saw declarer win with the jack, cash four hearts and repeat the club finesse for ± 120 .

South ruffed the last of them with the ♠Q and exited with a diamond, declarer ruffing, cashing dummy's top clubs and claiming eight tricks, +720 and 12 IMPs.



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
