

On 2nd March the World Bridge Federation's Management Committee met to discuss the impact of the war in the Ukraine. In accordance with the resolution of the IOC, the committee unanimously decided to not allow the Russian National Teams to participate in the World 2021 World Bridge Teams Championship to be held in Salsomaggiore Terme, Italy. from 27 March to 9 April 2022.

Moving swiftly on, with two rounds remaining the podium places appeared to lie between the four teams occupying the top two tables in Round 7.





If the Editor indulges me, I will mention the time I was playing with the mercurial Roman Smolski in a club duplicate in Nottingham and the bidding started 2NT-Pass-6NT at which point Roman overcalled 7♣ which I alerted.



When my right-hand opponent enquired I explained that we played Asptro over notrumps. My retreat to 7 ◆ (denying three hearts!) was doubled but I manged to make enough tricks to lose only 1400 − a complete top against the array of +1440s that adorned the traveller.



East led the ♠J and West took the ace and returned the queen to declarer's king. Declarer unblocked the ♠K10, played a heart to the king and cashed three diamonds discarding two spades and a club. Two rounds of hearts ending in hand left declarer with the club guess. When he opted to cash the king he had chosen wisely, +990.

Turnips defeated Bentley 58-30, 16.42-3.58 VP which left them on 102.74. Snapdragon had edged past Alpert 57-52, 11.48-8.52 VP which left then in second place, with 87.22. The opera singer was not quite in full voice, but she was certainly warming up.

In theory 3♠ has no real chance, and South cashed the top clubs and then switched to a heart, North taking the king and ace and then returning the ♠2. Declarer won with the ace, ruffed a club, played a spade to the king, cashed the ♦K and then took two rounds of spades forcing North to lead into the diamond tenace for -100.


Suppose declarer plays low on the spade switch? He wins in dummy, plays a diamond to the ten and can take all the remaining tricks for a useful start.

North could have avoided this potential disaster by switching to the ♠J or the ♣Q.


Declarer took North's lead of the ♠Q with dummy's ace, drew trumps, played a heart to the king and a spade towards the jack, finishing with ten tricks, +130.

When NS followed a sequence that suggested they were not over-endowed with points West produced a Flint like 'Tiger Double'. In many partnerships it asks partner to lead their shortest major, in others it relates to a specific suit, usually spades.

Playing in the Sunday Times event Omar Sharif saw the bidding go 2NT-3NT and was looking at [AKQJx and he doubled for a spade lead. However, his partner proved to be void in the suit!

Here East was in no doubt as to the meaning and led the ♠K followed by the seven which gave the defenders the first five tricks and still left declarer with some work to do. West exited with the ♥J and declarer took the ace and cashed the ♦K.

When West's ten appeared he crossed to the ♣A and then played two more rounds of clubs. His mind made up, he ran the ♦J to restrict the penalty to -100, still an 11 IMP loss.

Lorenzini was not alone; for the Mixsters Tom Hunt found the same double and was rewarded the same +100.
