How best to describe 6♠?

Bold, courageous, imaginative, gambling. I'm sure you can think of many alternatives. North led the ♣A and switched to the ♥3, declarer taking the ♥A, cashing the top spades and the ♠A and then playing a diamond to the ten to pitch a heart on the ♣K for one down, -100 and a 13 IMP loss.

On this deal everyone reached 3NT by East, South leading the ♣3 three times, the ♥5 three times and the ♥9 and ♦3 once. Before I tell you what happened, how do you rate your chances (and you have the advantage of being able to see all four hands).

You only have five top tricks, but chances of more in every suit.

On a club lead suppose North takes the ace and switched to the ♥2, South winning with the jack and returning the ♥9. That gets you up to six tricks. Suppose you go to dummy with a diamond and play a spade to the queen, South winning and exiting with the ♥5.

Now you can afford to play a club, but let's assume you are not brave enough to risk everything by putting in dummy's eight. When the \$Q\$ holds you play a spade to the ace and South follows with the ten. At this point you might think you only need to guess the spades (does the phrase restricted choice ring any bells?) or find diamonds 3-3. At this particular table declarer cashed the \$A\$ and was left with only eight tricks, which cost 12 IMPs.

What declarer might have done is cash the ◆K and then cross to dummy's ace. When North discards on the third round you can be reasonably confident his shape is 4-4-2-3 so you have every reason to finesse in spades.

A heart lead is more testing.

If it is the ♥5 you can take North's king (note the situation in the heart suit) and play a club. If you get the spades right you should emerge with nine tricks.

However, the ♥9 is much more testing. If you fail to cover with dummy's ♥10 North withholds the ♥K and you win and play a club.

An alert South hops up with the ♣K and continues with the ♥J and you have no way to get to nine tricks. Playing the ♥10 forces North to play the king and now you

can win and play a club when it does not help South to hop up with the ♣K because you are the player with the ♥8. At the table where the ♥9 was led declarer played perfectly (covering with the ♥10) to reach a three-card ending where only a spade guess was required.

The play made it virtually certain that South held the ♣K and two other clubs, three hearts, four diamonds and the ♠K10 while North was known to have four hearts, only two diamonds and at least three clubs. Was South's unknown card a club or a spade? Declarer played for it to be the ♠9.

A diamond lead is also awkward as if declarer wins in dummy and takes a

spade finesse, South wins and plays back a diamond. Its better to win in hand and play a club, but if North wins and returns a diamond to dummy declarer must play a spade to the ace and a second club to dummy, only then playing a second spade. South wins and exits with a diamond to dummy, but a winning view in spades allows declarer to endplay South with a diamond and score two hearts at the end.


3NT was made on three occasions, the only swing coming in the match between Parker and Albert.

At the end of this round Scandiscots had 98.29, Mixed Goods 91.72. Their head-to-head encounter in the final round would determine this year's winners.

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Final Round



East led the ♣Q and declarer must have been concerned when dummy appeared. However, when East discarded on the first round of trumps 12 tricks turned into 11, +650.

A club lead does not immediately doom 6, as after discovering there is a trump loser declarer can play on diamonds, trying to discard three more hearts from hand. With the suit breaking 3-3 it proves to be a forlorn hope.






North led the ♠Q for the king and ace and when South returned the ♠7 she won and continued with the ♠2, South carefully ruffing with the ♥J. Declarer overruffed, went to dummy with a diamond and played a heart for the eight, ten and queen and was one down, -50.



West led the ♥3 and declarer won with dummy's queen, East unblocking the ♥J, and cashed six clubs. When West pitched the ♠Q declarer ducked a spade to the ace but West exited with the ♦10 and East won and played the ♥10 giving the defenders the rest for two down, -100.

Here East contributed the ♥10 to the first trick. When declarer cashed the clubs East pitched the ♥4 and West decided to discard three hearts. Now declarer could play dummy's ♦Q and then cover East's ♥J. West won and played two rounds of spades. In the excitement declarer forgot the ♥7 was a winner, but he still had nine tricks, +400 and an 11 IMP lifeline.

North led the ♣4 for the three, jack and ace and declarer cashed the ♥K and then ran the ♦J, South winning with the queen



and switching to the ♠5. North won with the ♠Q and went back to clubs, locking declarer in dummy. After cashing four hearts a diamond saw South win, cash the ♠A and exit with a spade, North taking the setting trick with the ♣Q, -50.

Here the play diverged at trick three, as declarer cashed the ♥J before playing the ♦7 to the king and ace. When South returned the ♦10 declarer had a ninth trick and claimed, +400 and 10 IMPs that sealed the deal for our champions, Scandiscots.

Oddly enough, the only genuine way to make 3NT is to develop a ninth trick in clubs. Once South has played the \$\ J\$ at trick one you can play a club to the king at trick two, collecting South's \$\ J\$, come to hand with a heart and play a club. If the \$\ J\$ does not appear at trick two you still have the chance of finding the \$\ A\$ onside.



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
