South led the $\quad \mathrm{J}$ and declarer won in hand, cashed the top spades and played a club to the jack. A heart to the queen saw South ruff and switch to the $\$ 2$ and in due course declarr lost a club for one down, -50 . There is a way to arrive at 12 tricks, but it is not easy.

If declarer assumes the lead is a singleton, the strongest move is to take dummy's ace, unblocking a high heart from hand, ruff a diamond, cash the top spades and then play a club to the jack. That is followed by a second diamond ruff after which declarer plays on hearts. If South ruffs in at any point she is endplayed, but discarding down to $\uparrow \mathrm{J}$ \&K10 allows declarer to exit with the $\boldsymbol{\$} 10$ forcing a lead into the split tenace.

Declarer put in the $\vee 9$, cashed the $\diamond K$ and played the $\& \mathrm{~K}$. He was assured of six tricks, but -300 meant the loss of 4 IMPs.

West took the \&A but that was the last trick for the defence, -550.

East led the $\vee 3$ and when dummy's queen held declarer continued with the $\vee \mathrm{A}$, overruffing West's $\uparrow 10$ and playing the $\$ 10$ for the $\$ 10$, the $\% \mathrm{~K}$ and the $\% \mathrm{~A}$. A diamond saw East take the ace and exit with the $\uparrow 7$, declarer winning and returning the $\uparrow \mathrm{J}$.

East won and could have played the $\checkmark \mathrm{K}$ for three down, whereas the $\vee 9$ allowed declarer to win with the $\diamond \mathrm{K}$ and play a club, escaping with six tricks, dummy taking trick 13 with the 9 . - 100 was worth 9 IMPs.

## Round 8

Although Tulips + had won all their matches, they were not yet certain to be crowned as champions. However, the win prediction factor which has become popular in so many sports was heavily in their favour.

When that also survived he continued with the $v$ and South won and exited with the 9 . Declarer ruffed, exited with a diamond and was assured of two more tricks, +170 along with 7 IMPs.
